What is Mental Health Counseling (MHC)?

Mental health counseling is the assessment, treatment, or modification of a disability, problem, or disorder of behavior, character, development, emotion, personality or relationship through verbal or behavioral methods. Mental health counselors are trained in counseling and psychotherapy to treat individuals with mental and emotional disorders and other behavioral challenges. Mental health counselors demonstrate a concern for the short-term and long-term well-being of individuals, couples, families, groups and organizations.



What services do licensed mental health counselors provide?

Mental health counselors provide psychotherapy, clinical assessment and evaluation, treatment planning and case management, prevention, discharge, and aftercare services. After identifying and evaluating mental health problems and related human development challenges, mental health counselors employ effective methods of counseling and psychotherapy to treat individuals with conditions that may include mood disorders including depression, anxiety disorders, substance abuse, eating disorders, personality disorders, dementia and adjustment disorders. Mental health counselors assist patients to develop skills and strategies to address issues such as parenting and career skills; problems in adolescent and family communication and functioning; couples, marital and relationship problems; and preventing the occurrence or re-occurrence of alcohol and substance abuse. MHC is a licensed degree and MHCs work in clinics, Yeshivas and schools, hospitals and private practice.

What is unique about a Mental Health Counseling education?

Although there is overlap between what a licensed Mental Health Counselor and other mental health practitioners can do professionally, there is significant difference in the education that MHCs receive. The core educational component of MHC programs focusses on counseling, behavior and abnormal psychology with a curricular focus on diagnosis, psychopathology and treatment intervention to be a psychotherapist.

What is Achieve Behavioral Health?

Program Outline

The Ferkauf MHC is a 60-credit Master of Arts in Mental Health Counseling that combines theoretical knowledge, clinical training, field work and mentorship opportunities. Graduates of this program, with required post-graduate experience, and who pass the NCMHCE examination, are eligible for licensure as Licensed Mental Health Counselors (LMHC) in New York State. The program can be completed in either four or five semesters, depending on the student’s educational plan and cohort. The following outline is an example of the courses a student can expect to take each semester with the goal of completing the program in five semesters. Please note that the course schedule is subject to change.

Internship structure

The internship is where your education translates into practice. A requirement of the MHC program is 600 hours of supervised fieldwork which can be fulfilled through direct work with individuals, couples and groups. The integrated internship through Achieve will provide students with the advantage of working with leaders in the mental health field who understand the needs of the community and will impart students with an educational experience that will teach them the skills needed to be successful practitioners. Students may be eligible to receive compensation for their internship hours.

Admission requirements

To be considered for admission into the program, potential students must have completed 120 credits towards a bachelor's degree from an accredited institution. For an application to be considered, potential students must submit the following materials:

- A copy of the Undergraduate/academic transcript from an accredited institution
- Personal Statement (one page discussing the student's interest in the field and career goals)
- Application form
- Current Resume
- Two letters of recommendation on official letterhead

In addition, an interview with Achieve staff is required and potential students will be asked to provide an in-person writing sample. All application materials should be submitted for review to the Achieve program administrator through the achievemhc.org website after which they will be submitted to Ferkauf Graduate School of Psychology for approval. Decision letters will be sent by Ferkauf directly.

Tuition and Fee structure

Colleges and Universities typically charge students on a per credit basis which means depending on how many classes a student takes each semester determines the total cost. The per credit cost for the program is \$947. For example, if a student is taking four, 3-credit classes in a semester (12 total credits), he/she can expect to be charged \$11,364 in tuition for that semester. Additionally, every semester students will be charged a \$70 registration fee and a \$255 technology fee. The overall cost of the 60-credit program if completed in five semesters is \$58,445. All tuition and fees will be paid to Yeshiva University.

Financial Aid

To be considered for financial aid each student must complete a free application for federal student aid form, otherwise known as a FAFSA. U.S. citizens and eligible non-citizens can apply at <https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa>. If you are a New York State resident who has filed a FAFSA, you can apply for additional scholarships by filling out the TAP application at <https://www.hesc.ny.gov/>



FAQ's

How long does it take to complete the MHC program? The program is structured to take students under two years to complete when following the curriculum outline. Students must complete the required 60 credits to be considered for graduation. Each course is worth 3 credits. In order to maintain satisfactory academic progress as a full-time or half time student in the program, students must maintain an overall and semester grade point average (GPA) of a minimum 3.0.

Are classes in-person or remote? The MHC program is a remote/virtual program. Most courses offer an in-person option as well.

Which institution will be granting my degree? MHC program graduates will receive their degree from the Ferkauf Graduate School of Psychology at Yeshiva University, a leader in psychological training since 1979 and ranked amongst the top psychology schools in the country.

Will I need a computer to participate in this program? Yes, an internet capable device will be needed to attend classes, communicate with professors and to complete assignments.

Are scholarships available? After you have been admitted to the program, students can fill out the FAFSA and discuss the possibility with the Yeshiva University Office of Student Finance. At the end of the first year, MHC students can then apply for additional scholarship funds for their second year.

After graduation, do I need a license to practice as a mental health counselor? The MHC program is registered with the New York State Education Department as a program that meets the educational requirements for LMHC (Licensed Mental Health Counselor) licensure. Upon graduation, MHC graduates will then need to register for a limited permit to complete 3000 hours of post-master's-supervised experience and pass a licensure exam, before they are officially an LMHC. Graduates can receive compensation for services rendered while completing the 3000 hours of post-master's-supervised experience.

What exam is New York State using to test counselors for the license? The national exam that New York State requires for Licensed Mental Health Counselors is the National Clinical Mental Health Counselor Examination (NCMHCE).

Will I be able to bill insurance for services once I am licensed? Graduates of the Mental Health Counseling program who ultimately establish their own private practices can establish relationships and contracts with most of the major insurance companies who accept LMHCs as part of the treatment plans for their clients.

Can I take out student loans? Financial aid eligibility for federal student loans is based on the results of your FAFSA, your graduate degree program, and your anticipated enrollment status (a minimum of 6 credits or halftime status is required each semester)
